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## Student's Essay at first attempt in white space.

### General Comments:

Thanks for writing this and choosing to work with me. My name is Kasey and I'm going to be grading a fair portion of your essays from now on. I hope that I am able to help you not only improve your writing, but also grow to enjoy the process. Unlike many other subjects, in writing, the star of the program isn't anybody but YOU. You're never going to be the star of an algebra problem, even if you solve it better than anyone else. By default, though, you'll always be the star of your own writing. So, without further ado, let's get started.

### Good things:

- Strong first paragraph. I like how you set the scene with an overview of how school can be viewed, then transition into talking about it from your own viewpoint. Transitioning from a larger view to a more personal view is an awesome way to grab the audience's attention. Why? You talk about something that almost everyone has experienced - school - then you apply it to yourself. Nice.

- Good examples in the second paragraph. I like how you give examples of specific classes and why they are hard. This is pretty cool. It helps the reader to understand what you mean by "school" and to visualize exactly what sorts of problems you're discussing.

- Well-rounded conclusion. A lot of people actually have some difficulty writing a meaningful conclusion. You overcome the problem here by telling us why what you've said is relevant. School is hard, but it's worth it in the end because it's a paving stone to future hard work. That's a solid thing to conclude. It expands the scope of your essay, which is awesome.

### Could be improved:

- Third paragraph. The logic of this paragraph breaks down. The structure isn't as tight as that of the other paragraphs. My guess is that you had an easier time writing the first and second paragraphs, as there is a clearer progression of ideas. The third paragraph just sounds muddled. Reflect on what you did differently and how you felt differently when you wrote Paragraphs #1 and #2 versus Paragraph #3. An ability to self-reflect is one of the most important qualities of the good writer. More than anything, you have to identify what works for yourself.

- While you are very specific, you could be even MORE specific. How is that possible? Well, first off, let's define our terms. What do you mean by "school"? Do you mean the building? The students? The friends? The teachers? It only becomes clear later on that by "school," you mean academic work - classwork, homework. The earlier you define that or make it clear that you're focusing your essay on that, the easier it is for the reader to see where you're going with all this. Also, your teacher makes you learn "methods to solve a problem that are different from [what your parents taught you]." That's interesting. Talk in more specifics about it. Do they use lattice multiplication rather than normal? The quadratic formula instead of factoring? What about Spanish? What makes it hard? Do you have to memorize 50 terms a day? Help your reader visualize exactly what you're talking about. The more specific the example, the better. Also, what is a "good grade?" The term means different things for different people. What are we looking for? B+? A+? C? As you can see, the more you narrow it down to specifics, the more the reader can understand.
